Westwind lies, Sphinx rises

Here's a sad/happy tale of two boats. Both are 12-Metres, built by Abeking and Rasmussen some 70 years ago and, until recently, used by the German Navy as sailtrainers. In 2005 the navy decided to sell them off, and a consortium hoped to buy and restore them, and keep them together in Flensburg.

However, for the unlucky boat, *Westwind* (ex-*Inga*), the consortium was outbid and the boat removed – to a then unknown destination.

Just recently, she was discovered in a sorry state in Southampton. We gather that her frames are rusting out and, to be restored, she would have to be virtually dismantled. Her owner, a UK-domiciled German, has not been heard from for some time. The deck was shrinkwrapped by the yard as an emergency measure to keep out the rain.

The more fortunate boat, known to the Navy as Ostwind but originally, and now, again, Sphinx, was bought by a group including Oliver Berking of the Robbe & Berking Classics and 12-Metre World Championship, where she was due to make her restored debut on 5 July.

Sphinx was also built by A&R, in 1939, using funds subscribed by the people of Hamburg, for the Norddeutscher Regattaverein (NRV). Following the war, when there were limits on the size of yachts Germans could own, *Sphinx* was sold to two club members who had Chilean passports and a well-stocked woodyard; payment was in larch, oak and mahogany, from which A&R built many boats for the club. In 1958 *Sphinx* was sold to the naval college, Mürwik, which renamed her *Ostwind*. Relaunch, postrestoration, was on 22 May.

Replica of James Caird

The International Boat-building Training College at Lowestoft (see p62) has just been awarded a contract to build a replica of Shackleton's whaler the *James Caird*, for a reenactment of his 1916 Antarctic expedition. The project is to feature at this year's Earls Court boat show.
